	Most children start formal education at primary school at the age of six.		
	Primary education is free in Malawi's government schools. The primary		
	school takes eight years from Standard 1 to 8, at the end of which pupils		

write the Primary School Leaving Certificate examinations. Students have to pass and get selected if they are to attend secondary school education in a government secondary school.

Secondary School

Secondary school education takes four years, from Form 1 to Form 4. Students can attend secondary school in public schools run by the government or private schools run by the private sector and individuals. Students in secondary schools sit for two examinations: a Junior Certificate (JC) Examination at Form 2 and a Malawi School Certificate of Education(MSCE) Examination at Form 4. Both examinations are set by the Malawi National Examination Board (MANEB).

Tertiary education

In Malawi, Universities are accredited by the National Council for Higher Education (NCHE). There are six accredited public universities and a few accredited private universities. Access to tertiary education in Malawi is competitive, as these Universities cannot admit all deserving individuals. Malawi's current tertiary gross enrolment rate is at 0.8 percent.

Entry Requirements to Tertiary Institutions

To gain admission into Universities in Malawi, one must meet entry requirements set by the National Council for Higher Education (NCHE). Currently, the requirement is MSCE, IGCSE, or any other internationally recognized qualification comparable to 'O' level certificates with at least six credit passes (a minimum of grade '6' at MSCE or 'C' at IGCSE), including English Language.
